Magi from the East came to Jerusalem, asking,
"Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews?
For we observed his star at its rising,
and have come to pay him homage."
When King Herod heard this, he was frightened.
—Matthew 2.1-3

Herod is afraid. This is the root of his strutting, his meanness, his cruelty to children, the poor and wayfarers, his disdain of anyone who doesn't adore him. He is afraid. This is the well of his bluster. the spring of his violence and hatred. In his fear he will insult his critics, threaten his neighbors and assault the weak. In desperate fear he will strain for every illusion of his grandeur, his excellence, his power. He is most afraid of light, so he will sow darkness and veil the truth. He is most afraid of love. so he will grow a calloused heart, and tremble at true gentleness. He is most afraid of grace, so he will send his army to slaughter. But he has already lost. This is why he is afraid. He is no match for love and light and grace. His evil has already failed. His victims are already resurrected. We are not afraid. We all have our fears. It could be guns or needles. It might be losing a job or a loved one. It is when we let our fears take root and water them with righteous indignation, seeking out only those who we believe think like us that they tend to grow and take over the landscape of our lives. When we make decisions based on fear, we quickly discover that we become less of who we are at our core. When operating from a place of fear, our mode of presenting ourselves to the world becomes enshrouded with defensiveness. We become porcupines who view anyone approaching us with an alternative viewpoint as a possible enemy. This siege mentality has certainly been given room to grow and flourish this past year here in the U.S. How will 2019 be different for us?





The new year here at church begins with the end of the Christmas season on Epiphany, Sunday, January 6th. The word *Epiphany* refers to the revelation of God who is embodied by Jesus as revealed to the three magi who come to visit him, most likely months or years after his birth, bearing gifts fit for a king. The love that this young child embodies is deemed a threat, the perfect set up for the scared Herod who rather than facing his fear returns it by trying to eliminate all those who could pose a threat to his vise-like grip on power.

While it is tempting to let our fear turn sinister as a form of self-protection, perhaps with this new year we might take a different tact. The loving way may seem hard and totally unrealistic but as we approach what would have been the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s 90th birthday this month we might embrace his words, "Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that." (We will have the honor of hosting the Martin Luther King Day Service put on by the Interfaith Council of the Northshire here in our sanctuary on **Monday, January 21 at 7:00 p.m.** Hopefully, many of you will be able to join us)

In her newest book, *Almost Everything: Notes on Hope*, Anne Lamott grudgingly acknowledges the hard to accept instruction of her pastor in the midst of our increasingly divided culture, "Just don't let them get you to hate them." Hate has a way of incapacitating us and making it hard to let the part of us that is kind and generous and loving shine through. I am writing this a few days before Christmas and so I am immersed in thoughts of Luke's Gospel account of the birth of Jesus realizing that the words that were meant to be a response to the terrified shepherds on that night long ago are also meant to stay with us in the midst of the fear and hate that surrounds us: "Fear not: For behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy." May love, birthed in deep and abiding joy, be the better path for this new year that has broken forth among us.
