Once again Holy Week and Easter will take us on the roller coaster ride from celebration to betrayal to humiliation and suffering to death and burial and ultimately the glory of resurrection. In many ways it covers in a single week the wide ranging experiences that are happening in lives around the world on any given day. Few of us may ever personally go through such drama in seven days but in encapsulating some of the best and worst of humankind, Jesus is taking us through the depths and heights that are our shared experience of what life is about. We as church together will go through the highs and lows of these accounts that we know so well and so I would invite you to be with us for any and all of Palm/Passion Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and then Easter itself at both sunrise and again at 10:00 From Palm/Passion Sunday through Easter we will make the journey of everyday experiences and the range of emotions that make up a given week. Maybe for this Holy Week, we could rest in each day, finding the added meaning of our story in light of Jesus's and then come together on Easter Sunday to once again raise our Alleluias.

May these words of blessing, these beatitudes, based on the sayings of Jesus on the cross also known as the Seven Last Words, offer you a boarding pass onto this flight we call Holy Week that we will take together:

Beatitudes for very particular people "I thirst."

Blessed are active and recovering alcoholics — and all who come out of surgery and are longing for that swab, those ice chips, for they will find living water.

"Truly, I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." Blessed are those who are incarcerated – sleeping it off one night or looking at mandatory life, those in brigs and immigration detention centers, county jails, maximum security, house arrest, witness protection, or probation, for they are promised Paradise.

"Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani"

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Blessed are the forsaken ones —
the depressed and despairing,
the suicides
and those who love them —
for their cries are heard.

"Woman, here is your son." "Here is your mother." Blessed is anyone who accepts another's child by adoption or fostering, through mentoring or teaching or coaching. Bless the aunts and uncles, the neighbors and case workers, the friend of the family, or friend in spite of the family.

Blessed is anyone who cares for another's parent, or nobody comes to visit this elder, because the ex isn't doing it or the old coot, crabby naomi, whiner has pushed everyone away.

Blessed are these for they do God a favor.

"Abba, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Blessed are all of us who make mistakes, who choose the wrong side, of something large or insignificant, who think the crown-of-ethnic joke is funny, who hear the rooster crow — coward, who roll the dice of being a soldier and it comes up PTSD, who wash our hands of something we could have changed, who are caught in a crowd and hear ourselves yell some hate or hurt, for we are forgiven anyway.

"Abba, into your hands I commit my spirit."
Blessed are those who are in hospice today, at home or in hospice houses, and all of those who care for them – family and friends, volunteers and home health aides, nurse practitioners and drivers, doctors and chaplains, for their spirits are in God's hands.

"It is finished"

Blessed are those who have died this year, for them it has begun.



Scholarships Available to Arlington, Sandgate and Sunderland Students

The Federated Church of East Arlington will once again be offering "Bentley Family Scholarships."

The Bentley Scholarship Fund was established by the Trust of June A. Bentley who taught both music and business in Arlington schools and who believed in developing the potential that each of us has within us.

Anyone who lives in Arlington, Sandgate or Sunderland, or who went to Arlington Memorial High School, and will be attending college or graduate school in the Fall of 2019 is welcome to apply.

What do people see on your face?

Much of the public has an image of church people being serious, stern and in some cases, down right grouchy! What would it be like if the public saw us with smiles on our faces? Now, I don't mean we should put on some sort of fake, sickly-sweet smile (that is as big a turnoff as a stern face!) . I am talking about a genuine smile that comes from a place of deep joy. After all, we Christians do claim that it is Good News, so shouldn't our faces reflect that reality?

When we walk around with a smile it reflects a joyful soul. And of course the reverse is true. We have all been around people who seem to always have a furrowed brow and grim expressions. We get drained by such people and try to get away from them. But imagine, if from a place grace and knowing we are God's beloved, we smiled more. Edward Hays, in his book Chasing Joy, talked about the practice of smiling that has a profound effect on us and others:

"Experiment with smiling frequently throughout your day; upon entering the supermarket and while shopping; waiting for stalled traffic to move again; or upon entering a room. Smile frequently also when you are working alone and see if you don't begin to experience the joy of life".

I imagine you see any number of people in the course of a week. What a gift you can give them with a smiling face and warm expression. In a world with less and less community, your effort to live joyfully can make all the difference. To quote Ed Hays once more: "To those hungry for welcome and acceptance, a smiling face is food and drink".


