When our gaze moved downward we also took in the beauty of our gardens that our next door neighbor Misty Hosley worked hard to rid of weeds and gave new life to the flowering plants and shrubs. And in this beautiful treasure that we call church there are small acts of love happening every day.

When we look to the news of the world it can sometimes seem difficult to see the light and life abundant that we know is present. With mass shootings and a burning Amazon rainforest it can be hard to wade through it all with any vestige of hope. Immigration and the opioid crisis can leave us full of frustration and wanting to throw in the towel and asking, "How will things change?" They will change because of small acts of kindness continuously offered. When we add your small bit to my small bit which is added to your pew mate's small bit and so on with each of us doing our part, we live out our faith. One example of this is that we face down he hard news of immigrants' suffering on our southern border with the UMCOR Hygiene Kits we've been gathering with some help from our friends and neighbors, including 36 kits from our sister UCC church in St. Johnsbury

which heard that we were doing this and wanted to help. We've also generated financial support for more kits from folks stopping by our table at the Arlington Village Farmers Market.

In the letter to the Hebrews we are encouraged by the words, "Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us." Perseverance, when we witness and hurt because of the pain and suffering of others, is ours to live into while not growing cynical or hopeless. To continue to follow paths of service coupled with prayer can be our means of healing small bits of the world.




