Amid the beauty that is Advent and the chaos that can be the run up to Christmas, there is plenty of both the ordinary and the extraordinary. The ordinary is found in the fact that we still get up, follow our morning routines and begin the living of each day be it with a hot shower and a bowl of oatmeal or a hurried brushing of the teeth and giant cup of coffee. There are still bills to pay, groceries to purchase, laundry to wash, and classes to The chores around the go to or teach. house are still there and extra time has to be built in just to warm up the car as winter moves back in.

And then there is the extraordinary. Of course, that includes the wonder of children we know and love as well as the devotion to telling the familiar story of Jesus' coming into the world in a slightly

different way against the backdrop of hymns that get everyone singing in our Christmas pageant set for December 15 during Worship. May this season of Advent and the celebration of the birth of the Christ child find you landing gently in the ordinary <u>and</u> fill your days with awe at the extraordinary in our midst. 

Vermont Women's Fellowship Adventures in Reading

May 30, 2012

Dear Janet,

Thank you for all those reports and their suggestions. I see that you have some new readers. That is good, but sometimes new (and even old) readers need to be reminded of the rules. So, in a form you can pass on to your readers, ere are some things they should know:

To be a qualified reader, you must

- 1) Read one book from each of the four groups between July of this year and July of next. I AM ASKING YOU TO PROVIDE YOUR REPORT TO ME BY 5/8/13.
- * 2) The book can come from any of these sources: a) this year's list, b) any past list, c) an author on a present or past list who has a book not on a list but in the right category, d) re-reading a book on a present or past list, e) complete recorded books, whether you are handicapped or not.

To suggest a book for next year's list

- 1) Pick a book that you have read and liked so well you want to share it with your neighbors. It can be a New book or an old one on any topic. It doesn't matter whether the critics like it or not. The important Thing is that you think it is worth reading.
- 2) Tell enough about the book to convince the Selection Committee to choose it. We usually have about Twice as many suggestions as w have room form, so most of our work is eliminating suggested books! It is easy to dispose of books that just give a title and author, or just tell us that it is a good book.

The kind of list this is — and is not

- 1) It is a list for readers of different tastes and different levels of reading ability. Reading is for everybody. Books written for children and young people sometimes contain a lot of adult wisdom.
- 2) The list is not primarily religious or limited to clean language or situations. The problem of living are Not always clean and proper, and we can't expect books about to be. We do try to warn sensitive Readers when a book contains really strong stuff, though.
- 3) The Selection Committee tries to include books from varying points of view on social, political, and Religious questions by qualified authors. We try to maintain a balance, especially on controversial Topics, not reflecting our own views but the questions of the times.


