Meditation, Meanderings and Musings from Pastor Kathy

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In spite of us being smack-dab in the middle of winter with more snow, ice and cold in store, we turn toward the season that takes us on a journey beyond weather toward a destination that is familiar and yet different every time we arrive. We will enter into a time and space that writer Paula C. Hawkins calls The Awkward Season. The season of Lent will begin on Wednesday, February 26 when many of us will receive ashes in the form of a cross to mark the jumping off point for the 40-day journey to the Resurrection at Easter. One reason we might consider this The Awkward Season could be the fact that it starts in the middle of the week which tends to throw folks for a loop since we are so accustomed to church traditions beginning on Sundays. And about Sundays - they are not a part of Lent because every Sunday is to be a day of celebrating the Resurrection so they are in Lent but not of Lent.

There is no one way to do Lent. For some, there will be fasting or abstaining while others will add a discipline like daily Bible or other devotional reading. Still others will seek out opportunities for service to others or devoting a portion of ones resources to those in need. The good thing about Lent, which in English comes from the word "spring" and which Barbara Brown Taylor describes as "a springtime of the soul," is that there is no right or wrong way to observe it.

The invitation to explore the desert places as well as those brimming with life is extended for this unique time on the church calendar. To end the season of Epiphany and prepare for Lent we will hold a Dinner Church around the theme of Fat Tuesday & Mardi Gras on Tuesday, February 25 from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. in Bailey Hall. It will be a free meal of pancakes, sausage, king

cake and other goodies. We will open the season of Lent on **Ash Wednesday**, **February 26** in two ways. Our service and voluntary reception of ashes here at the Federated Church of East Arlington will take place at **12:00 noon**. Once again, after a few years' hiatus, we will also be distributing **Ashes to Go** with the Rev. Mary White in front of St. James' Episcopal Church on 2/26. Drive or walk up for ashes and a blessing at any of the following times: **7:30 – 9:00** a.m., **12 noon – 1:00 p.m.**, **3:30 – 5:30 p.m.**

If you are looking for written reflections and prayers that you can bring home and use throughout Lent, there will copies of the Lent 2020 Devotional from the U.C.C. titled, *Deliver Us* available on the Do Something table in Bailey Hall. We are also partnering with our friends at St. James for a Lenten Book Study. The title of the book is *Holy Envy: Finding God in the Faith of Others* by Barbara Brown Taylor. This book is also on the Adventures in Reading list for 2019-20. We will meet on Friday mornings at 9:00 a.m. at Chauncey's over breakfast or coffee (you don't have to eat there) from February 28 – April 3. If you would like me to order a copy of the book for you, please sign the sheet in Bailey Hall or let me know by phone or email no later than February 16.

As we begin this journey into *The Awkward Season* may we carry the words of Sister Joan Chittister with us: "Lent is about becoming, doing, and changing, whatever it is that is blocking the fullness of life in us right now." May we travel together in the confident knowledge of God's abiding presence.

Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation

From the Center for Action and Contemplation

Summary: An Evolving Faith

The Work of Healing Tuesday, December 31, 2019

Up to now, top-down religion has pretty much spoiled the show. We need trained experts, scholars, leaders, and teachers, but the truths of Christianity must be made much more accessible, available, localized, and pastoral. Most people do not need to have encyclopedic knowledge of theology or Scripture. To begin with, why not flatten out the huge and unbiblical distinction between clergy and laity? [1]

While Christian churches do much good, we have one huge pastoral problem that is making Christianity largely ineffective—and largely decorative. Solid orthodox theology is sorely needed (and yes, I am obsessed with it), yet we clearly need good and compassionate pastoral and healing practices *ten times more!*

It seems to me that we must begin to validate Paul's original teaching on "many gifts and many ministries" (1 Corinthians 12:4-11). Together, these diverse gifts "make a unity in the work of service" (Ephesians 4:12-13, Jerusalem Bible). Individual communities may do this well, but on the whole we need Christian people who are trained in, validated for, and encouraged to make home and hospital visits; do hospice work and jail ministry; support immigrants and refugees; help with soup kitchens or food pantries; counsel couples before, during, and after marriage; share child development resources with families; offer ministries of emotional, sexual, and relational healing; help with financial counseling; build low-cost housing; take care of the elderly; run thrift centers—all of which put Christian people in immediate touch with other people and for which no ordination is needed. Ordination would probably even get in the way. Remember,

healing was most of the work Jesus did. This fact is almost too obvious.

My vision of any future church is much flatter and much more inclusive. Either we see Christ in everyone, or we hardly see Christ in anyone. Frankly, my hope for Christianity is that it becomes less "churchy," less patriarchal, and more concerned with living its *mission statement* than with endlessly reciting our heavenly vision and philosophy statement—the Nicene Creed—every Sunday. There seem to be very few actionable items in most Christians' lives beyond attending worship services, which largely creates a closed and self-validating system.

Simply put, any notion of a future church must be a fully practical church that is concerned about *getting the job of love done—and done better and better*. Centuries emphasizing art and architecture, music, liturgy, and prescribed roles have their place, but their overemphasis has made us a very top-heavy and decorative church that is constantly concerned with its own in-house salvation.

PRAY FOR PUERTO RICO

New Report on the earthquakes in Puerto Rico (contact moorejudy22@yahoo.com)

Here is a small report received Jan. 20th, from Lydia Rosaly, our on the ground coordinator, who lives in Ponce, one of the towns hit by the recent earthquakes:

"The aftershocks are continuing - around 3 or 4 a day registering 4.0. There are still thousands of people sleeping outside their houses and thousands of refugees in camps. It is all so sad and frightening. But people in the north (where the quake did not hit and where our volunteers stay and work) are good. They are living their normal lives.

There is a reporter from CBS, David Begnaud, who is doing an amazing job covering everything that is happening. He has all his interviews on his facebook page.

In terms of Our UCC Mission work, everything is back to regular schedule. This week volunteers are finishing some work in a church in San Juan and then will move to working roofs in Ceiba, Las Piedras, and Humacao.

As far as traveling near the quake area, volunteers are definitely not coming to the south unless they want to do it themselves. We do not want them to take the risk."

As you may know, there are several stages when dealing with the aftermath of a disaster. For example, with Hurricane Maria, we are in the recovery stage since there are systems in place for volunteers to come and help (including housing). The earthquake disaster is in emergency response stage. To help with the quakes, go to UCC Disaster Response and respond to our appeal of raising \$250,000. 00.
